

Most flatland whites not hostile

— survey

EIGHTY-FIVE percent of whites who took part in a pilot survey in the Albert Park area do not mind Indian, coloured, black or mixed families as neighbours, according to Mr Sayed Iqbal Mohamed, president of the Durban Central Residents Association.

He said today that of 20 white families picked at random, 17 did not have any objection to people of other races living next to them, while three said that the Group Areas Act should be enforced rigidly and that they wanted the Indian, coloured and mixed families out of the area.

"The pilot survey was done to clear the way for an investigation into white attitudes to neighbours of colour. Our field workers will be calling on families for their views from this week," said Mr Mohamed.

He said the pilot study proved there were many whites who did not want the Group Areas Act and were prepared to live in open residential areas where other races could also live in harmony.

Three families, two Indian and one mixed, had moved out of the area.
